Make your at-home paint job look and feel like you paid big money using essential pro tricks, TLC tips, spring's trendiest shades, and innovative formulas. Your lesson starts now.

FOLLOW YOUR SHAPE
Nail crazes come and go—remember the pointy almond? The squoval? Luckily, the one that's most flattering (and, quite frankly, the easiest) is also trending for spring. "I'm seeing more and more people embrace a short length that mirrors the natural curve of the nail bed," says Madeline Poole, nail artist and Sally Hansen Global Color Ambassador.

[TLC TIP] Trim your nails when they are dry and by making a few small clips in an arc shape (rather than straight across), then gently file with an emery board, Poole says.

To get tidy cuticles and a smooth, even surface—hallmarks of a salon mani—gently push back cuticles. This step creates more polish space and ensures you're painting on a flat surface. Then buff the nail plate with a buffing block to "get rid of the bumps you sometimes don't even see until you start painting the nail," Poole says. Finally, clean everything with soap, water, and a nail brush to whisk away any dust or debris.

TIC TIP Use an orange stick when working on your cuticles. "They're more gentle than using a metal cuticle pusher, which can scrape through the nail plate and leave debris," Poole says.

STICK TO THE SURFACE Even if you don't have time for a full hand massage, a quick application of lotion will moisturize hands, nails, and cuticles, which is essential. But after you've treated yourself, remember to clean the nail with polish remover. "You want your nail plate to be clean of oils and creams to ensure the color adheres to the nail better," Poole says.

[TLC TIP] Swab your nails with a formula that won't leave them bone dry. Try Cutex Nourishing Nail Polish Remover, \$3; jet.com.



TLC TIP Wait a couple of minutes after applying each coat. That way, Poole says, "the last coat will dry a lot quicker, so you're less likely to mess up your manicure."

Once your polish is set, live your life, but be aware that extended water exposure or using your nails as tools contributes to chipping and shortens the lifespan of your manicure.

TLC TIP Apply cuticle oil twice daily to keep the enamel flexible and prevent chips.

GEL MANI REMOVAL

Salon gels last about two weeks without a chip, but they can leave the nail underneath thin and fragile if you peel or pick at them. "When polish is forced off, you take off layers of the nail plate, which weakens the nail," says Jane MacColla, founder of Hortus Nailworks in New York City. Soak nails in pure acetone for at least 15 minutes, until the gel lifts and you can flick it off.
